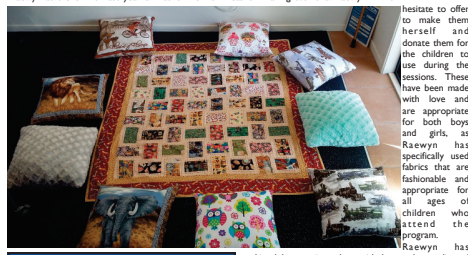

Tania Hanlon, Program Coordinator for Central and South Taranaki, approached Raewyn at the end of last year and asked her for ideas on making cushions. Raewyn didn't



hesitate to offer to make them herself and donate them for the children to use during the sessions. These have been made with love and are appropriate for both boys and girls, as Raewyn has specifically used fabrics that are fashionable and appropriate for all ages of children who attend the program. Raewyn has combined her sewing talent with her understanding of what the children are dealing with, and her empathy for these children, as she shares a similar experience of childhood loss. SFG aims to strengthen the social and emotional wellbeing of children and young people who are dealing with any grief, or other significant life changes, due to circumstances such as death of a loved one, migration, significant family members going to prison or into foster care, or parents divorcing or separating. Gardening With Cleavees

LSNA Issue In Inglewood (Kevin Rowan)

The LSNA (Likely Significant Natural Area) issue is about to raise its head in Inglewood. Readers may be aware of the issue in the Clifton area last month. What this means is that there are around 300 properties in the Inglewood area who will receive a letter from the District council regarding protecting native bush on their land. This arises from the Resource Management Act (Government legislation) which requires Local authorities to act to protect these areas. Council has taken a very soft approach, but been taken to task by conservation groups because they have not been as strongly enough. There will be an open day at the Inglewood town hall on Wednesday March 8 between 11.00 am and 2.00 pm. There will be three separate areas where farmers may talk to council staff on a one to one basis, to deal with specific details relating to each individual property. The initial review was done from aerial photography, so may not be 100% accurate and staff are more than happy to address concerns and make changes to areas where appropriate. If further open days or public meetings are required then these will be arranged. So if you receive a letter we suggest you take a deep breath, count to ten, and then consider going to book an appointment for 8 March to talk through your individual situation.
