Wandering Elephants Stop Off In Inglewood
Three wandering wattle elephants suddenly appeared on the Village Green. A real show stopper, they attracted huge numbers. Viewed rapidly with plenty of people going to check them out and get their photos taken. The family of three-life size toy-like elephants were created by UK artist Steve Hanning and were part of the Powerco Tararua Garden Spectacular.

The elephants are crafted from willow woven over steel frames by a four-person team in the United Kingdom over several months. With the male standing at 8 feet 6 inches high, the female 7 feet, and their "baby" at 3 feet, the trio appeared unannounced in different locations around the province during the garden festival. Funded by The TSB Community Trust, they will be on view at the festival as a garden art installation.

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Gardening Clues (With Sue from Hammer)
All gardeners at some time, go and find their roses, ornamentals or vegetable plants absolutely smothered in aphids, almost seemingly to appear overnight. So should we deal to them or leave them alone. If you see only a few, simply squashing them with your fingertips will do, but if they get out of control, read on.

Aphids are small, soft-bodied insects, which are usually 2 - 4 mm long and they often cluster on young shoots and flower buds or underneath older leaves. There are many different species of aphids which vary in colour from green to yellow and black. Aphids attack fruit trees, roses, carnations, chrysanthemums, other ornamentals and a wide range of vegetables. Aphids also transmit virus diseases such as broad bean wilt, which colonies multiply rapidly in warm weather, and large infestations can develop in a number of days. Check your plants a couple of times a week at the beginning of warm weather so that aphids can be controlled when populations are relatively small. Look out for natural predators such as ladybirds and parasitic wasps.

The only way to keep aphids under control is to use a systemic insecticide. This is a chemical which is taken up by the plant and moves through its vascular system. It kills aphids when they feed on the plant. Systemic insecticides are available in a number of forms, including granules, liquids, and sprays. They are most effective when used at the beginning of warm weather, before aphids have had a chance to establish themselves on the plant.

I have discovered that if you want to know something about Inglewood "ask Peter".

Well, here it what he had to tell us. He said "It was the Inglewood Fire Siren" and was later shifted to a concrete pole, which was situated at the boundary of the Town Hall section, and the property next door (where the flats are now). The ball had a chain attached to it and when pulled, the fire siren would then ring out. Later it was operated from the telephone exchange at 12 noon. This siren was high and out of reach of children.

Succession Planning For Your Farm (Gemma Leathem)

The farming industry is the backbone of Inglewood's economy. Many of the farms in our area remain in families for generations. Parents have a natural desire to pass on control and eventually ownership of the family farm to the next generation. Every family is different so designing a succession plan is not a matter of 'one size fits all'. To create a successful plan the following five points need to be considered:

- 1) What do the parents want?
- 2) Are they able to cover themselves for a comfortable retirement?
- 3) Is the operation viable (how profitable is it)?
- 4) The farm must be looked at as a business first and foremost. Emotions must be put to one side and the parties must consider if it is viable to pass on a farm if it is losing money.
- 5) What does the rest of the family want?

Each family member needs the opportunity to have their voice heard and their honest opinions and expectations understood by all.

If a fair result is not necessary or an equal result, parents may feel a moral obligation to divide a farm equally among their children but this can create financial trouble for those whose sole income may come from the success of the farm as opposed to a job outside of the farm.

5) Tax considerations in the restructuring of the property.

Farm succession is a contentious issue with various interests and emotions intertwined, handled incorrectly can result in disaster for families. SURE TO RISE

In 1879 Thomas Edmunds came to Christchurch from England. Later that year he commenced the manufacture of baking powder in response to customer wanting something better than what was available then. At some time after the name 'Sure to Rise' came into being and has remained ever since.

As early as 1899 the baking powder started winning prizes no doubt for its quality.

The first listed for more than 100 years but have now been replaced by cardboard containers.

The older generation will remember the Edmunds factory that was on Ferry Road in Christchurch. Not only was this 3 story building a landmark but the immaculate gardens between the road and factory were well worth a visit.

Unfortunately both the factory and the gardens have long since disappeared. The Taranaki Aviation Transport and Technology Museum has some of the older sites, as photographed, on display as part of the collection of household items collection.

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
