September is a busy month in the garden calendar. The days are getting longer and the weather warmer, but gosh we certainly had a couple

weather warmer, but gosh we certainly had a couple good frosts this last week, so hope you covered over those early season potatoes. If you haven't already prepared the soil for your vege garden, now is the time to get started. If it doesn't need turning over, just spread a couple of bags of compost over the bare soil and dig through the top layer before you plant. Sow seeds of carrots, parsnip,

layer before you plant. Sow seeds of carrots, parnip.

beerroot, silverbeet, peas, lettuces, leeks, cabbage tomato, capsicum, courgetts, melon, cucumber and egglant. Transplant to the garden as the Sow peas, snow peas, runner and both beans, directly in to the ground. Protect from any frosts, and don't plant too deep, as they can root. Of course you can always plant seedings, lettuce, leeks, cabbage, corn, pumplic, neeley, onions, silverbeet, courgettes. Just remember to stagger planting green salad

Continue replacing your winter flowers with new spring annuals as needed. A pinch of blood & bone as you plant your annuals will give them a head start. Continue to replant your pots, if the potting soll is old it will be depleted of its nutrients, so remove the dols old, and new container mix and fresh new flowers.

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Inglewood Heritage Centre - Inglewood Sale Yards (Richard Jordan)

The latest Heritage Centre exhibition, curated by Gay and Kevin Laurence has opened. It shows the Inglewood saleyards that were an integral part of life in past times for our community.

In 2002 and with other factors at play, while sales were over 25,000 in LOUZ and with other factors at play, while sales were over 25,000 head per year at Inglewood in comparison with Stratford's at 5,500. Stratford won the battle for Taranak's one centralised saleyards. This meant the closure of the Hawera and Inglewood Yards. It was a end of an era in Ineliance.

It was a end of an era in Inglewood. At one stage the turnover at the Inglewood yards was the third highest in the North Island. But 2002 Taranaki Farmers held their final sale at the Inglewood.

An 1901 news paper excerpt quoted "The Inglewood Borough has said no cattle saleyards will be allowed within the Borough". This was why the saleyards were built on the now Tarata Road (Formally was why the saleyards were built on the now Tarata Road (Formally Junction Road) over the Kurapete Stream, east of the township. The yards were built by The Farmers Co-operative Organisation Society in 1916. They were a substantial undertaking, practically all the timber used in the construction was Jarnah. The yards opened in opposition to Matthew & Gamilin's yards on the corner of Dudley Sales were held every Wednesday and most farmers spent the day at

The women folk would use this day to shop and gather groceries. Wednesday was town day for rural folk, business and pleasure combined. In early times there were two companies involved in the saleyards. Farmers' Co-operative Organisation Society (FCOS) and Newton King.
