Along with the Gold star, Lance was awarded Honorary Life Membership to the Brigade. It is with this kind of commitment that Inglewood's Volunteer Fire Brigade is able to continue to serve our community.

## Garden Clues with Sue (Sue Marah)

The first weeks of November, you should be preparing gardens by cultivating, adding mulch, manure and compost. Some of you will have done this, but you need to always work on your soil. If you follow the moon calendar, then you should plant root crops in the full moon phase, which is this week. Around the 9<sup>th</sup> of the month, then it's time to prune, and harvest crops, and have a tidy up. On the new moon, which is the 15<sup>th</sup> November, get ready to start planting more above ground crops, and for the rest of the month just keep sowing, planting and pruning. Of course, if you're like most busy people, then you'll just plant as much as you need, when you actually get some time!

There are plenty of lovely new petunias around, as well as the new Calceolarias in beautiful colour. The Calceolarias Can-Can Bumble Bees features vibrant, unique bicolor pattern with large flowers which bloom from early summer into autumn. These sturdy and beautiful Calceolarias have vibrant flowers that cascade down the sides of hanging baskets and pots. This season they perform in pots or hanging baskets or table centre piece. With a mounding growth habit, they are easy care plants and for best results keep them perfect on that sunny spot or in partial shade.

In the vegetable garden, everything can be planted now, and even though there will be no Inglewood Harvest Festival next year toohoo, we still have Atlantic Giants for you and you pals to grow, and have your own competition. If you're into eating, there are plenty of choices of pumpkin and squash to grow, so give it a go, you'll be happy you did. Happy gardening.

## A Life Worth Living (and it's not over yet!) - Taranaki's Newest Author


### A LIFE WORTH LIVING (and it's not over yet!)


An ex-Inglewood High School student, George Gallop has published a book, "A Life Worth Living (and it's not over yet!)". Many who were around Inglewood in the 1960's may remember George and the mischief he always seemed to get into. His life has been considerably different to most boomers, as a child, living on lighthouses, attending boarding school from the age of eight and then Inglewood High School.


With the technology of today there are no longer manned lighthouses so this way of life has now gone forever. There are very few private boarding schools for primary age children in New Zealand. George left Inglewood in the late 1960's and headed for the Eastern Taranaki back country and his narrative tells a great many humorous stories of the characters he encountered there. He worked for the Whangamona Pest Destruction Board, and later managed all biodiversity and biosecurity for the Taranaki Regional Council.


In his book he highlights many aspects of his 50 years involved in professional, commercial and recreational hunting. He makes it clear the way things were in his day and makes a number of projections as to the way things will be for young hunters in the future.


But this book is far more than a hunter's story. It is a story of a man who spent over 40 years in Search and Rescue, almost 40 years as a Mountain Safety Council Firearms Instructor and 32 years as a Fire Fighter with the Tolo Volunteer Fire Brigade. Someone who has contributed to Taranaki communities in no small way. I know because I have been his wife for over 50 years. George and I are now retired on a small farm in Tolo. ### Farm Music Taranaki (Karen Clarke)

As you walk into Michael Self's workshop, some of the first things you will notice are frames with various tools hanging from them. "What the heck is that?" you might say. One frame features a row of pitchforks, another a collection of picks, mallets, grubbers, spades and a crowbar forged from an old car drivshaft. An engine hoist has a steel tyre from a drag hanging from it along with some steel skeletons and a pair of shears. From Layne McDonald's shed in Stratford there is a mounted steel gate with the struts cut at different lengths complete with a resonating chamber. Out of Wayne Morris's shed there are mounted hand saws, circular saw blades and much more. These are all instruments for the Farm Music, Taranaki installation/performance which is part of the RESET 2020 festival. Farm Music, Taranaki is being presented in partnership with the Taranaki Retreat and Rural Support Trust. The event is the brain child of Sally Barnett who has enlisted renowned musician Chris O'Connor (think Phoenix Foundation and a host of other musical achievements) and sound sculptor Bridget Johnson to bring this intriguing and fresh event together. Farm Music is about exploring new ways to play with sound and to create your own instruments and improvisations from items found in your own backyard shed, paddock or garage. While on this exciting new path it also draws on the origins of many musical forms where "Stuff" was used to make music; think the blues, shuffle, jazz bands, working songs and in many cases gave rise to a number of dance forms. Like these traditions Farm Music has a focus on creativity, bringing people together and well being supported hence its association with the Taranaki Retreat and the Rural Support Trust. The public can enjoy the installation and performance at a free event on Sunday 8 November, 2.00 - 6.00pm in the Alexander Room, TSB Showplace. Michael will be there to give any Inglewoodians a warm welcome.







### Rotary Hosts RYPEN (Mel Cook)

The Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment (RYPEN) was again hosted by the Inglewood Rotary Club at Verical Horizon over the weekend of 18-21 October.

Sixty 63 nominations were accepted for the course but only 37 were finally able to attend, due to withdrawals for exams, COVID fears and other events on at the same time. Students aged 15-17 years from the lower North Island were selected and sponsored by 26 Rotary clubs to attend a weekend of enrichment of their leadership, self-confidence and friendship.

A group discussion on the Friday night sought to draw out those things that was a challenge for the youth of today. The standout concern of all students was the influence of social media on their lives. Those that didn't bring their own were dressed for the part by Rotarians amidst some protestations! Several Rotarians and partners joined the group for Saturday dinner and enjoyed the skits from each team.
