The Jobs for Nature funding, which will be distributed throug the national kiwi charity Kiwis for kiwi, will allow Experienc Pürangi to expand the current project area a further 5775k. Kiwi are highly territorial birds, and the resident population is now growing to the extent that many are migrating out of the land under predator control. The inclusion of the additional land will allow the organisation to work to protect those birds

as well.

This additional acreage will be to the south and east of the current conservation area, and will also connect with land to area and the green shows the come under predator management by Te Kohanga Ahura, the just-announced pest control Collaboration between northern just-announced pest control collaboration between northern Tarnanki iw Ngati Tama, Ngati Mtrunga and Ngati Maru. The announcement was also a major boost for Experience Purang's expansion plans called Te Whakakotahi which, as well as involving an increase in the amount of land under predator control, also involves development of a field centre at Purangi and construction of a native bird rehabilitat centre and kiwi house in Inglewood.

Riparian and Shelter Belt Planting

The soil is still warm enough to encourage ood corgrowth which will mean your rees will e able to establish well before the real rigours of rinter hit and be ready to burst into growth with he arrival of spring. fanting shelter belts and riparian strips which are

rranting sheeter bers and riparana strips which are essentially a vaterway bank planting can add a lot to a property. As the name suggests a shelter belt is planted to essentially provide shelter. This can be to slow or direct the wind or to provide shade, in this respect belt can have effects out in a paddock of about 13 times its height.
