## Inglewood Water Update (Charles Woollin)

INPDC is halfway through the \$2.5 million Inglewood pipe upgrade, replacing very old pipes with new ones. We are currently installing about 7 kilometres in total. This includes the two main pipes between the town and its reservoir, pipes which over the years has seen a build-up of natural minerals such as aluminium, magnesium and iron. On October 15, a valve in the water network was turned off, so we could install some new pipework. When the valve was reopened allowing the water to flow again, it unfortunately stirred up natural minerals in the pipes, resulting in discoloured, treated water running through the system. We'd like to apologise for any inconvenience this incident caused. As a precaution, we asked people not to use their taps. That said, we want to be clear, drinking the discoloured water in small quantities for short periods of time does not pose a significant health risk. But as a precautionary measure we advised people to not drink the discoloured water. That's why we organised a water tanker to be stationed at the Inglewood railway station to provide clear and free water. Also, please thank a New World Inglewood who provided free bottled water. We are in constant contact with the Taranaki District Health Board around the quality of our water and perform regular testing on all our supplies. Over the next year, work will continue on finishing the pipe replacement project and we thank all residents for their ongoing patience and understanding. ## Garden Clues with Sue (Sue Marsh)

Feels like summer is almost here with the last few days warm and sunny. This week, let's look at Companion planting, which involves grouping plants together so that they can help each other to grow better. Growing certain plants together will also help deter insect pests ruining your carefully tended plants before you get the chance to enjoy them. Companion planting also works in a physical way. For example, tall-growing, sun-loving plants may share space with lower-growing, shade tolerant plants. Nasturtium attracts caterpillars, aphids and whitefly, so planting alongside or around vegetables such as lettuce, cabbages, beans and tomatoes will protect them. The adults will lay the eggs on the nasturtium leaves instead. The nasturtium can be pulled while the eggs are at a junior stage to stop the garden of this cycle. Plant marigolds close to crops that suffer from aphids and greenfly. Marigolds emit a scent that repels aphids and attracts hoverflies, which are a predator of aphids. Foxgloves have a growth-stimulating effect on all the plants near it. It is also said to protect the garden from disease and strengthen tender plants. Certain flowers are grown near edible crops in order to attract insects for pollination. Capsicums and eggplants, which have smaller flowers, benefit from having flowers nearby to ensure they get pollinated. Bee friendly plants include: calendula, marigolds, sunflowers, poppies, clover, nasturtiums, Queen Anne's lace, Echinacea, borage and purple yam. Herbs are also very useful, sage is a great herb to plant around celery crops, as it helps to keep aphids away while Basil improves the flavour of tomatoes when planted alongside. Basil can also be planted alongside capsicums. Plant dill and rosemary next to broccoli, while you can grow carrots and leeks together, as they both have strong scents that drive away each other's pests. Tomatoes are also compatible with chives and onion, and Sweetcorn does well planted with potatoes, peas, beans and squash. Think about how you can plant to help benefit the health of those flowers and vegetables in your garden this spring and summer. Happy gardening.

## 'Nana Jude' The Inspiration for Cancer Fundraiser (Rochelle West)

Bella Lane knows her Nana Jude would be proud she's helping Taranaki people tackle the disease that sadly took her life. Nine year old Bella 'Nana Jude', Judith Blundell, died in July at just 56 years' old, after a 12 year journey with cancer. During that journey, Bella visited her nana receiving chemotherapy treatment at Taranaki Hospital.

"Over the last couple of years, my nana and I have been doing Pink Ribbon breakfasts. This year we decided to do a high tea and fundraiser money for Chemo for Chemo," says Bella, from Inglewood. "This was very dear to our Not only has nana sat in those chairs, but many of our other family members have."

In mid-October, Bella organised scones, mini cupcakes, brownies and sandwiches, tea and juice for 22 friends and family in Inglewood, sending out invitations in her nana's honour. "Unfortunately, Nana Jude couldn't be with us."

The gesture touched the hearts of many, even some who didn't attend the high tea, with Bella raising \$1397 for Chemo for Chemo. "Nana would have been proud of me."

Julie Gillespie and Jenny Bunn, who are behind the Chairs for Chemo fundraiser, were moved by Bella's efforts. "Bella has done an amazing job. There are not many nine year olds who know how to raise \$1400," Jenny says. Julie and Jenny, who both have received chemotherapy treatment at Taranaki's oncology unit, are working towards raising \$50,000 to purchase six new specialist chairs for the unit, to be used by other patients also having chemotherapy. "During the last 15 years, 32,000 bottoms have sat on the chairs. It's very busy in the chemotherapy ward. The new chairs we are fundraising for will be the most up-to-date technology," Jenny says. "The new chairs will make the nurses' lives so much easier. They can manipulate them into whatever position a patient needs to be in," says Julie.

The women decided to fundraise for the chairs to give something back to the people of Taranaki after the support they received during their own cancer treatment. "It's quite a big journey and a lot of people support us and so we thought, how can we support other people in consultation with the oncology ward, a few ideas were bandied around, and this was the one that we could help the most people," Jenny says. "Everybody will benefit," says Julie. "After all, when it comes to cancer, we all know somebody, who knows somebody."
