Gardening Clues With Sue (Sue Marsh) Pronz 756007 July, the coldest month of the year generally, means its rose pruning time. Despite all the information out there about pruning roses, it is actually very easy to do.		
It is almost impossible to kill a rose by pruning it incorrectly and the best way to learn is actually doing it yourself. In New Zealand, most roses are pruned between late June and mid-August, depending where you live. Don't be tempted staft early as the loss win actually start growing again and then the new growth will get hi by the frosts, plus they won't flower earlier: if pruned earlier. Why do roses need to be pruned? First of all, it helps keep them to a manageable size in our gardens.
