

Windsor Walkway Upgrade

Going for a stroll in Inglewood will be even easier once the Windsor Walkway is sealed by NPDC. Work on the \$1.3m project kicks off this week which will see 3.7km of the walkway covered that is made of gravel or grass. "When it's finished, it'll be an all-weather walkway separated from the road, that'll be much safer and easier for everyone to use," says NPDC Local Councillor Marie Pearce.

"This new sealed walkway will allow more people to explore a beautiful part of our district whether you're walking the dog out with a stroll on a mobility scooter. The Windsor Walkway is a 4.5km loop in the south-eastern part of the town. This upgrade is expected to be finished later this year, weather permitting, and will include elements of cultural expression through a partnership with Pukerangora Hapa.

Conserving with the strategy of the ongoing upgrades to camp, Vertical Horizons were delighted to receive a grant from NZCT to purchase a new Massey Ferguson lawn and groundskeeping tractor after the retirement of the 1957 faithful Massey Ferguson which was no longer fit for purpose.

Taking delivery just before Christmas from Field Torque Taranaki, this has allowed camp to keep on top of the landscape work and Camp Director Paul Hitchcock says the new model has taken significant amounts of time off the ongoing lawn mowing jobs and the ability to get into the smaller areas makes the job a lot easier. 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Gardening Clues With Sue (Sue Marsh)
From 20th August
HAMMER
How time flies and here we are already into February, the last official month of summer. Everything is still looking green and lush, lawns are still growing, flower beds are looking amazing, and even those dreaded weeds keep on coming. Like it or hate it, we do need rain even in summer to keep everything growing, so long as it knows when to stop!

The biggest issue is as the garden grows and our crops are using all the nutrients in the soil, we need to replenish the growing media. Many plants are very hungry, and to keep everything still producing, you must feed your plants. If it consists, then use a liquid or granular tomato food, or for other vegetables, then use any of the products available that have the right nutrients, for example, if leafy vegetables then use one with a higher nitrogen content and so on. Top up your beds with either extra compost, vegetable or potting mixes suitable for what you are growing. It will also help to retain more moisture, and remember that everyone who weeds the garden, you are in fact removing soil which can expose the growing roots.

If you love peas, and have any of the perennial pea, growing, they do look a bit worse for wear after periods of rain. Don't despair and pull them out, simply give them a haircut, make a top up of fertilizer, and wait for the next flush of flowers, which will come when the sun shines. With some of the varieties, they actually like a really good cut back, it just makes them tidier as they re-grow...just like us when we get a haircut!

Whatever you are doing this week in the garden, enjoy, keep planting, keep trimming, and definitely feed your plants, just give them a little extra TLC. Happy gardening and enjoy the weather!

 In a disaster such as a big earthquake, there is likely to be widespread damage to power lines, water pipes, buildings and phone networks. Emergency Services will be dealing with the most urgent matters, and you may have damage to your home or require support. An Emergency Centre in the area maybe activated, this is where the community can access essential services and get support in the area.
 In the event an emergency centre is activated, the New Zealand Red Cross Disaster Welfare and Support teams are activated. There is 20 Disaster Welfare and Support Teams (DWST) around the country, made of around 300 trained volunteers. These teams are called upon to support the response in partnership with other agencies with their role providing practical support to community members.
 On the 19 February 6.30pm- 9.00pm the Emergency Management Team from New Plymouth District Council will be supporting the New Zealand Red Cross Disaster and Support Team to run an exercise at TET Stadium & Event Centre. The exercise will involve setting up the site as an emergency centre, these types of exercises are a great training opportunity for the DWST team. We welcome you to come along and take part, the NPDC Emergency Management team will be on hand to speak to community members about volunteering and training to assist in an Emergency Centre as a community volunteer.
