**Restore PG Nops Reserve News (Leigh Honnor)**  
You may not think predator trapping and weeding are interrelated but they are. For traps to function effectively both ends of the trap box or tunnel should be clear of grass, vegetation and leaf litter for up to 300mm. This creates a clear run into the trap for predators. During spring and summer there is significant weed growth in the reserve which means the forest floor is dense. As we remove the weeds it clear around the traps so they are easier to access for our target predators. Weeding at this time of year requires significant manual labour because of spring and summer growth. At the February working bee our seven trusty volunteers (Neil, Tony, Bob, Col, Arnie, Sean and Leigh) spent 17 hours checking the traps, weeding (serious culprits include convolvulus, Tradescantia, wild cherry, deadly nightshade, Montbretia, African clubmoss), and spreading bark over the weed area to slow regrowth.  
The native plants we have planted over the last few winters are starting because of our on going care. Over the next week are a 1.00 - 1.30pm Sunday 30th March. We meet at the Tawa Street entrance. Morrison died in 2018 at the age of 46, after a nine-month battle with cervical cancer.

The cyclists would be accompanied by Taranaki health and social services organisation Tui Ora's mobile health clinic - one of their kaimahi has been involved in the Ride for Tale since the beginning.



### Taranaki's Toughest Firefighter

Taranaki's Toughest Firefighter was held on Saturday 15 February at the foreshore. Ingwood volunteer fire brigade had three contestants enter: Mike Wilson, Erin Wilson and Jarrod Peters.

The toughest firefighter is a unique challenge consisting of five obstacles that firefighters complete wearing all their firefighting PPE. The first obstacle sees the firefighter scale two levels of scaffolding with a 45mm hose draped across their shoulders. When at the top, they hoist a 30L water can.



After a cooled hose from the ground to the top before scaling back down the scaffolding making sure to use each step. Obstacle two sees the firefighter hoist the Kestur machine with a sledhammer until the cable passes the goal, before the firefighter sets off for a dummy drag with Jane Baker directing quick jog through a zig-zag course. The firefighter must then pick up a charged length of hose, advancing through saloon doors and firing water from a set distance to hit a target. They then head to the final obstacle, the dummy drag which involves dragging a life size dummy 30.5 metres weighing 85kg.

Competitors compete in categories. There are categories for Natural (male) and Built (urban) firefighters as well as age groups.

Ingwood's results were Mike Wilson - Under 40 Male - Time 2:09:57, Erin Wilson - Under 40 Female - Time 2:12:90, Jarrod Peters - 40+ Male - 2:47:14.

The Ingwood brigade also volunteers. Janis Baker, Andrew Cotter and Helen Rose who are very much involved with the competition being on the committee of the Taranaki Provincial Fire Brigades Association Inc which run the competition. They give their time freely to help run and organise the event, thank you.

Ingwood hosted The Greatest Show On Earth between the years of 1952-1972, drawing in people from all over the motu who enjoyed the diverse entertainment and participating in exciting activities. To honour the winner of the Steeplechase, The Greatest Show On Earth Shield was brought in on a horse-drawn chariot to the TET stadium. When the show ceased to be held, the shield was lost. Thankfully it was rediscovered this year, fifty years after its disappearance. Jimmy Okeroa, the man who carried the Greatest Show on Earth shield, also carried Ingwood High School's prestigious Okeroa Shield. It is this shield that creates a competitive and exciting atmosphere throughout the school year, as our three whanau groups (Kokoroa, Koroa and Ma) compete annually to gain the most points through physical, cultural and academic endeavours. ### The Privilege of Age By Barbara Kuriger MP for Taranaki-King Country

One of the privileges of growing older is having so much to reflect on. In that time, we've had a rich tapestry of memories and experiences we can retrieve at our leisure. Looking back those moments can be pleasing, sad, or life-affirming; it provides us with a whole menu of emotions. The point is that the older we become, the more experiences we can draw from. **From Tragedy to Triumph**

Bruce Jordan is a Taranaki para-athlete, competing in triathlon and duathlon in New Zealand and on the world stage.

Bruce grew up on a dairy farm and spent a lot of his youth playing rugby, volleyball and surfing. But Bruce had a massive life change at 21 when he was involved in a hit-and-run accident ending up upside down in a vehicle with open fractures on both sides of his right elbow. All fingers were smashed, and that was the main median nerve in that arm. It meant that contact sports days were over.

But through his work he ended up in France on a road bike for the first time in his life, raising money for children's charities and cycling up Mont Ventoux. Bruce enjoyed the cycling in France and decided that triathlons looked challenging, although that meant learning how to swim all over again. Finance is a massive challenge for athletes competing at Bruce's level. Being completely self-funded, and the costs of competing for your country overseas with all equipment, is a huge challenge. The Foundation funding helped Bruce with his travel costs, allowing him to concentrate on training and competing at the Oceania Championships in Stockton and at the World Championships in Townsville last year. Normally, you compete in either short distance or long-distance races, but Bruce competed in both under PTSS category in both duathlon and triathlon. It takes a lot of dedication to train for both short and long-distance races. Bruce came home with two gold medals and world titles, so was a fantastic month.
