### Ingledwood RSA News (Richard Jordan)

On Tuesday 22 April at 4:00pm at the Ingledwood Cemetery, the Ingledwood RSA is unveiling a plaque to recognise the achievements of Harry Kerr. All are welcome to attend. Harry Edward Kerr, better known as Harry Kerr has an enviable place in New Zealand sporting history. As the 1908 London Olympic Games he became the first New Zealander to win an Olympic medal taking the bronze in the 3500m walk. He was born in 1875 and it was when he was at school that he noticed by Dave Blanchard that when walking to church he always arrived well ahead of anyone else. Dave then undertook Harry's training which, as the roads were that rough, took place on the railway line often paced by young lads running alongside while he walked. He always had exceptional sporting ability, a champion shooter, loved rugby, and was good at most track and field events, but walking particularly was the main attraction for the strapping 6'4in (1.93m) sportsman. As was often the custom at the turn of the 20th century, he bypassed the major events of the day to compete professionally, and was a regular at the big New Year Day pro meet at the Caledonian Ground in Dunedin, where he conceded massive handicaps. Harry eventually decided to turn amateur, which necessitated standing down from all competition for two years in 1905-06, which he filled by clearing bush on the family farm on Survey road at Tariki. Once eligible again for championship titles, he quickly stamped his class and secured his Olympic selection by winning Australasian one and three-mile titles at Hobart in early 1908. Australian authorities did not like what they saw and attempted to cast doubt on his 'new style' which had produced stunning times. But Harry ruled the track, here and in Australia, from 1908-1911 (winning national titles on both sides of the Taranaki). Harry's athletics were a considerable drain on the farm. Very much the gentleman, his travel and accommodation during the six-week sea journey to the Olympics, were at quite considerable expense. For his efforts he received a bronze medal, about a third the size of a modern Olympic medal, presented in a small box engraved 'Olympic Games, third prize 3500 Metres Walk, London 1908'. Although he also qualified easily for the final of the 10,000m race, he was forced to withdraw because of bruised feet, caused by the cinder track which many grassed athletes were unused to. Harry also returned from London a national celebrity and continued to dominate the national scene, winning New Zealand titles in 1911-12. His greatest walk was at the national champs in Wellington in 1911, when he won the three-mile race in 21min 36s, which remained the national record until 1946. He also enjoyed great success at the Australasian champs, winning three titles at the 1908, 1909 and 1911 meetings. He retired in 1912, walking away from his sport, marrying Isabelle Foster from Brighton, Christchurch in 1913. He fought in Europe in World War I before making a stunning return, coming out of retirement at the age of 46 in 1925 to again win the one and three mile New Zealand titles in Wanganui. Always an outgoing character, Kerr continued to follow sport avidly, representing Taranaki in lawn bowls. A former Tariki resident Graham James said his father Edgar James and Harry Kerr served together overseas during WWI, returned together and were neighbours and good mates. Mr James said Kerr was possibly more devoted to sport than he was to farming and was a Taranaki representative lawn bowler and an avid rugby lover. "I think he was a teetotaler before he went away to the war, but that changed too," he said. Harry won six New Zealand titles: one mile walk 1908, 1911-12, 1925, three mile walk 1911 and 1925 and was inducted into the New Zealand Sports Hall of Fame in 1996.

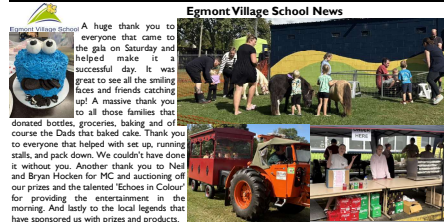

### Parvo Alert Important (Greg Hall)

The serious gastrointestinal viral infection Parvo Virus has, yet again, made a resurgence in dogs in Taranaki. We have seen cases in both Waitara and Inglewood right through this summer.

This is a highly infectious and often fatal disease of dogs that causes severe gastrointestinal symptoms such as profuse vomiting, severe liquid foul smelling diarrhoea (often with blood), depression, dehydration, thirst, no appetite, rapid weight loss, shock and death. Treatment involves full scale isolation, ongoing intravenous fluids, antibiotics, anti-vomiting medications and intensive care. Despite the disease is often fatal in unvaccinated dogs and young dogs.

The disease is spread by virus passed in infected faeces. The virus is really resistant and stays in the environment for 7+ months. Apparently healthy dogs that are incubating the disease can be spreading the virus around without yet showing symptoms. Some older dogs show only mild symptoms but still shed virus in their faeces.

Serial vaccination of puppies until they are at least 12 weeks of age is essential. Vaccination at (6, 9, 12 & 16 is needed for complete vaccination. The vaccine takes 7-10 days to 'kick in' so the dog still needs to remain away from potentially infected areas (parks, beaches, footpaths, places known to have had infected dogs) for a couple of weeks following the 12 week vaccination. After proper vaccination the dog is protected for up to 3 years (variation occurs).

We use strict isolation protocols for treating infected dogs. We believe vaccination works and it is, by far, cheaper than the cost of intensive care to treat the virus or the grief caused by the loss of your beloved dog.

Take Parvo seriously and respect public areas where other dog owners frequent. Talk to us about getting your dog Parvo vaccinated up to date.
