Gardening with Cluesless

With September 1st just around the corner spring is not that far away. It is time to get into the garden and have a tidy and to start thinking about preparing and planning for spring planting, including sowing seed potatoes as most crops take three months to mature so you have a good yield for your Christmas feast they need to be in the ground in September. Leading up to spring there is plenty to do in the vegetable garden from planning your crops for the coming season, preparing the soil adding nutrients, compost heap choppings and digging it over and planting some cold hardy vegetables. Kale, lettuce, cauliflower, silver beet, onions and herbaceous are able to be planted at this time of year. With spring knocking on the door it's all about the power of the flower. Daffodils are always a sign of spring to go with new born lambs, buds on fruit trees may be starting to plump or fatten up getting ready to burst into blossom as the days get longer and the temperatures warmer. Continue planting strawberries for a summer harvest.

Navigating Tariffs: A Perspective

Success doesn't always have its rewards. That is the perception some may have as the imposition by the USA of a 15 per cent tariff on New Zealand exports, while some of our principal trading partners, such as Australia and the United Kingdom, get only a 10 per cent tariff. The rationale for our higher tariff, we are told, is that, unlike Australia and the United Kingdom, we export more to the United States than we import. One way of looking at that, somewhat to our disadvantage, is that we, and I mean mainly our primary industries, are more successful at exporting and importing than those two countries and other countries that have secured lower tariffs. And I think it's going to stay that way and here's why: we produce a premium product; in the case of red meat, wool and wine, probably among the best in the world. Yes, we may see a downturn at the lower end of the U.S. market, but at the higher end—the premium end—I think we will hold our own because those who appreciate quality will be, as they are now, prepared to pay for it. Those people know that New Zealand produces some of the best food and wine in the world. Our farmers and winemakers do so proud. And while they maintain their quality output, that will be our main hedge and protection from that higher tariff. In a related vein, I was intrigued to learn about a new book titled "The Have and Have Yachts" by Evan Osnos. The book discusses the growing discontent among America's affluent elite with the current socio-political climate, leading many to seek alternative places for living and investment. Notably New Zealand is increasingly becoming their destination of choice, valued for its green landscapes and pristine environment. In conclusion, while the tariff may present challenges, I am confident that New Zealand's exceptional reputation and quality products will enable us to navigate these obstacles successfully.
