 Late autumn is the ideal time to prepare and repair lawns before winter sets in. While the soil is still relatively warm and there is usually good moisture around, grass can recover quickly from summer wear and establish strong roots before colder weather slows growth. Start by raking away fallen leaves, dead grass, and moss to allow air and light to reach the lawn surface. Repair bare patches by loosening the soil, adding quality lawn seed, and lightly covering with topsoil or lawn mix. Keeping these areas moist will help seed germinate before winter temperatures arrive. Aeration compacted lawns is another worthwhile job at this time of year, helping water and nutrients penetrate deeper into the soil. Apply an autumn lawn fertiliser that is lower in nitrogen and higher in potassium to strengthen roots and improve winter resilience. If your lawn has uneven areas, spread a light layer of topsoil to level hollows and improve drainage. Regular mowing should continue through autumn but avoid cutting grass too short heading into winter. A little lawn care now will ensure a greener, healthier lawn come spring.

Silver Family Take on BMX World Championships (Sarah Silver)
 The Silver family is preparing to take on the world stage after three members of the family qualified for the 2026 UCI BMX World Championships in Brisbane, Australia this July. For most families, having one rider qualify for the prestigious international event is considered a major achievement. In the Silver family however, both children: Lexi and Cece, alongside father Scott Silver, will all proudly represent New Zealand at the Championships. Fifteen-year-old Cece Silver, a student at Inglewood High School, currently holds a New Zealand #2 ranking in his class and continues to perform strongly within the national BMX scene, last year holding the Oceania #1 title. Twelve-year-old Lexi is also currently ranked New Zealand #2 in her age group and will proudly represent New Zealand for the third time, having previously ridden for the New Zealand Mighty Bivens Test Team in both New Zealand and Australia. Their father Scott Silver, a lifelong BMX rider and coach previously a Junior Elite rider, will also compete at the World Championships alongside his children, making this a rare and exciting opportunity for the family to represent New Zealand together on the international stage.

The BMX World Championships is the highest-level international event in BMX racing outside of the Olympic Games and attracts riders from around the globe. The family is currently training hard, and fundraising to help cover the significant costs associated with attending the World Championships, including travel, accommodation, insurance, and race entry fees. Remembering Mary Gyde

Mary Gyde was born on 16 August 1943 in Otago, near Hawera, to Brian and Maudie Suanes. As a young girl she attended St Patrick's Primary School in Hawera, famously riding her horse to school, a detail that perfectly captures her spirit and lifelong love of animals. She later became one of the founding students of Inglewood High School. From an early age, Mary developed passions that stayed with her throughout her life: horse riding, tap dancing, music, theatre, and performing. She loved being involved, loved entertaining others, and had a natural gift for bringing joy wherever she went. Before starting her family, Mary worked at Deem and Shearer Solicitors in Inglewood. After marrying the love of her life, Barry Gyde, on 5 September 1964 at Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Inglewood, she dedicated herself to raising their five children and supporting a busy family life. Mary gave herself wholeheartedly to everything she did. She was deeply involved in theatre, netball, choir, music, photography and community life. Over the years, she achieved so much, becoming a Life Member of Netball Taranaki, Inglewood Netball, and the Inglewood TET Club. She was also honoured with the New Plymouth Citizens Award, the Life Achievement Award from the Durham Women's Institute, and a good service badge from the National Federation of Women's Institutes all recognising her enormous contribution to the community and the people around her. After raising her family, Mary worked as a Divergent Therapist at Marinoto Rest Home for 20 years. She loved her work deeply, as caring for people came naturally to her. Later in life, when Mary became a resident there herself, the staff and nurses became like a second family to her, and to her loved ones as well. Mary leaves behind a lifetime of memories of joy, laughter, music and performances, where her presence made everything feel lighter. Mary showed us what it means to give, to participate, to care, and to live with spirit. A Service for Mary was held on Wednesday 20th May at the Sacred Heart Catholic Church.
