Celebrating Matariki and Puanga (Karan Moratti)

June - July is the time we celebrate The Māori New Year of Matariki or Puanga.

The best time to spot Puanga (Rigel) from Ingwood this season is to step outside in the early morning between 6:30am and 6:30am.

Look toward the northeastern sky and locate Tautoro (Orion's Belt), the three bright stars in a straight line. Directly above this line, you will see a piercing, icy blue diamond. That is Puanga. The star is visible throughout late May and June, but the most significant period for celebrations runs from mid-June to mid-July 2026. This year, the official Matariki public holiday weekend falls on Friday 10th July, the perfect opportunity to gather together and enjoy stargazing from an elevated rural road just outside of Ingwood. Take a moment to look up and celebrate our region's unique connection to Puanga. Happy stargazing!

Snippets from the Ingwood Primary School Library (Tracy White)

As we look back through the old logbooks and committee notes, it is fascinating to see just how much school life has changed over the decades. From the staggering cost of buildings to rather unique ideas about dental hygiene, our school's history is full of surprises.

We are compiling these wonderful memories ahead of our upcoming 150th celebration. If you would like to join us for the celebrations, please remember to register your attendance by contacting the school office or visiting our website www.ingwoodprimaryschool.co.nz.

In the meantime, take a walk down memory lane with these fascinating facts found in the archives so far:

Did you know?

- In 1879 a cost of \$10 to build a teachers' residence (\$300).
- In 1880 it was suggested that a separate infant school be built, as the teachers complained about having to spend so much time on infants, to the detriment of the more advanced scholars.
- In 1884 the schoolroom was used two nights a week for freehand drawing. The cost of renting the room was one penny (2 cents) a night.
- In 1894 at one school committee meeting no minutes were read, as they had been destroyed in a fire on Mastal St in 1894 (4 shops burnt down).
- In 1896 it was suggested that the cane be done away with and that the tawse (a leather strap with frayed ends) be substituted in its place.
- In 1904 the school was closed for a day on the occasion of the British / Taranaki football match.
- In 1921 concern was expressed as to the state of the pupil's teeth. There was discussion as to whether they should clean their teeth at school. This was declined, but one committee member stated they should at least make the children wash their mouths out with an antiseptic solution: Jeyes fluid or like the likes.

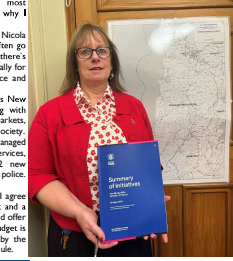
Pragmatic, Compassionate Budget Delivers Lifeline for Taranaki and King Country (Barbara Kuriger)

This year's Budget stands out as one of the most memorable during my time in Parliament. Here's why it took so long.

To me, the 2026 Budget from Finance Minister Nicola Willis is a unique mix of two qualities that don't often go together: pragmatism and compassion. For example, there's a major increase in infrastructure investment, especially for roads and rail, along with a focus on fuel resilience and supply. That's the pragmatic side.

On the other hand, it's clear the Budget recognises New Zealanders are facing tough times. We're dealing with heavy debt, global uncertainty, unstable trading markets, and rising fuel prices that affect nearly every part of society. Even with these challenges, the Government has managed to fund a \$55 billion boost for frontline health services, \$470 million to upgrade schools and add 272 new classrooms, and another \$50 million for frontline police. That's the compassionate side.

Some have called this a back-to-basics Budget, and I agree that's what we need right now. We need a Budget and a Government that focus on the most urgent needs and offer practical solutions. It's also worth noting that the Budget set to return to a \$2.6 billion operating surplus by the 2028/29 financial year, which is a year ahead of schedule.

Keeping Safe Tramping in Te Papa Kura-o-Taranaki this Winter (Sorell Mackenzie)

Winter tramping in Te Papa Kura-o-Taranaki can be beautiful with some crisp clear mornings and stunning alpine views. But being on Taranaki Maunga in winter requires adjusting for shorter daylight hours, freezing temperatures, and unpredictable weather and conditions, says Department of Conservation Principal Ranger Andy Johnston.
 "Enjoying the park safely this winter involves pre-planning, checking weather and avalanche forecasts, choosing winter-friendly tracks (and the right track for your group's abilities) packing insulated and waterproof gear, carrying emergency communication devices, knowing how to safely navigate river crossings and, most importantly, when to turn back." Climbing above the treeline on the Maunga in winter requires special skills, experience and preparation. There are increased risks from snow, ice, avalanche terrain, bad weather and sub-zero temperatures.
 The Mountain Safety Council and Department of Conservation websites are great places to start planning your trip up the Maunga. Even if you are planning just a short tramp, it's also a good idea to check in with the DOC Visitor Centre as they can provide up-to-date track information and help with planning the right trip for you. A temporary visitor centre is in the upper car park at Egmont Road end - www.doc.govt.nz
