

Te Ati/AWA North Taranaki Visitor Centre Taking Shape (Gina Blackburn)

Construction of the new North Taranaki Visitor Centre on Taranaki Maungā in Te Papakura o Taranaki continues to make good progress, marking an important milestone in a project that will provide a lasting benefit for both local communities and visitors to our region. Led by Te Kōwhiri o Te Aitanga in partnership with MBE Kānoa and Te Papa Aotahi Department of Conservation, the project represents a shared commitment to enhancing visitor experiences while respecting the cultural, environmental and historical significance of Taranaki Maungā. Over recent months, significant progress has been made on the structure, roofing and exterior works, and the building is now clearly visible from several points along Egnor Road. Window installation and weatherproofing works are progressing, with internal construction activities also beginning. Once completed, the centre will provide modern visitor amenities, interpretation, and information services, helping people connect with the history, environment, and cultural significance of Taranaki Maungā. The facility will also continue to support important operational functions, including search and rescue activities and visitor safety services. The project has provided ongoing opportunities for local contractors, suppliers and tradespeople, showcasing the skills and expertise available within our region while contributing to the local economy. As construction continues, Te Kōwhiri o Te Aitanga looks forward to sharing future updates with the community and celebrating the completion of a facility that will serve residents, mahāhū and future generations for many years to come.

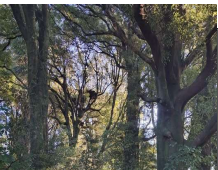

Democracy in Today's World (Barbara Kuriger)

As I write from the Presiding Officers' and Quakers' Conference for New Zealand, Australia and the Pacific, my thoughts turn to Democracy.

Democracy, broadly defined as a system of governance where power rests with the people, continues to be a cornerstone of political life in many countries around the world. In today's rapidly changing global landscape, democracy faces both new opportunities and significant challenges. The rise of digital technologies, the spread of social media, and increasingly interconnected societies have reshaped how citizens participate in democratic processes. While these innovations have made information more accessible and enhanced opportunities for civic engagement, they have also introduced vulnerabilities such as misinformation, polarization, and threats to electoral integrity. Globally, democracy is being tested by political instability, economic inequality, and the resurgence of authoritarian tendencies in some regions. Countries such as the United States, India, and parts of Europe have experienced debates about the strength and resilience of their democratic institutions. Issues like voter suppression, political corruption, and the erosion of civil liberties challenge the core values of democracy and prompt discussions about reform and renewal. 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Bird Flu Protocols (Greg Hall BVSc)

Bird Flu (H5N1) is spreading around the world and can affect wild birds, seabirds, waterfowl and some mammals. Early reporting helps protect wildlife, pets, livestock and our communities.

The Team at Energy Vets are still seeing injured wild birds at this time, but please give us a call before you bring them to the clinic. Once there, stay in your car and call us so that we can then triage i.e. Any sick wild birds please do not move them from their location and call MPI.

If you have your own birds that are sick or injured please call our clinic to make an appointment. Please stay in your car and call us to inform us of your arrival and we will have a vet come out to you to triage them.

HPAI H5N1 (H5 high pathogenicity avian influenza) has a low human health risk, however it can be spread to those working closely with sick birds. Dogs and cats can also contract the disease so it is a good idea to limit exposure to sick wild birds where possible. If you come across any groups of sick or dead birds, please keep your distance and report them to MPI's Exotic Pet and Disease Hotline on 0800 80 99 66. 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Garden Clues with Sue

August can be a frustrating month for gardeners. One day the sun is shining and you're full of enthusiasm, the next it's cold, wet and muddy! But with spring just around the corner, there's plenty to keep us busy.

The vegetable garden is calling. Prepare beds with compost, remove weeds before they seed, and start planting early potatoes, onions, peas, broad beans and hardy greens if your soil is workable. A little effort now will reward you with healthy spring growth. It's also an important month for fruit trees. Before buds burst, apply a winter clean-up spray such as lime sulphur or copper where appropriate to help reduce fungal diseases and overwintering pests. Always read the label carefully and choose a calm, dry day for spraying. Don't forget to remove any mummified fruit still hanging in the tree or lying on the ground, as these can harbour disease. The busiest gardening season is nearly here, so spending a few hours outdoors now will put your garden in great shape for the exciting months ahead. Happy gardening!

Family History Month (Mary Beckman)

August is Family History Month, celebrated by 'Granny Hunters' around Australia and New Zealand, with exhibitions, events and get-togethers to demonstrate what we do. How we rummage with various skills through the archives, stories and colourful byways of social history to trace the lives of our - and your - ancestors. It can be a solo effort, or a group one: here in Inglewood the Family History Group gathering is a social affair: we meet Mondays and Thursdays in the Library and exchange news and views on the latest challenges, and welcome our visitors with new ones.

It's never straight forward: there are the brick walls and conundrums which need patience, lateral thinking and puzzle-solving. There are the surprises (not so uncommon, actually) where we find for example that the great-grandpa of a respectable family seems to have not been the actual father of the grandson, but the neighbour over the fence has a prior claim. There's the sweet old lady you called Auntie Maud who turns out to be your first cousin once removed, because your grandfather's sister married their uncle. So many skeletons in the linen closets of Victorian houses!

Family History needs tales of names and dates to make sense of the passing centuries, but most of all it's about stories. Pioneer tales; how your great uncle perished in the Great War; how your great-great-aunt fought for the vote; what happened to your gold-hunting ancestor who disappeared into the Victoria outback, never to be seen again, until he reappeared, dying, in the Old Men's home in Perth. It's stories, stories, all the way. We love them!

Climate Debate (Urs Siger)

Community group Climate Justice Taranaki is excited to organise three election debates in the lead-up to the general election in November where local candidates will face the burning questions on climate policy, the environment and social justice. Aspiring MPs will have the opportunity to convince us voters how their policies will address the climate crisis in what we are hoping will be a lively and vigorous but fair and just discussion. Events in New Plymouth, Inglewood and Hāwera ensure that we cover all four Taranaki electorates.

In Inglewood, sitting MP Barbara Kuriger (National Party) will face her challenger David Paterson (Labour Party). The Taranaki-King Country electorate has been a safe seat for National since it was established in 1996. Is 2026 the year of change? Farming will be front and center at this debate. Barbara has a dairy farming background while David has a PhD in Ecology and Evolutionary Biology and spent 15 years as a crop pollination scientist at Plant and Food Research. Who has the solutions to bring down our agricultural emissions?
