

Gardening with Clueless ever thought about building yourself a raised garder

They can be as simple or as complicated as you like. What kind of timber? There's ongoing debate about what timber you should use, untreated hardwood like macrocarpa is ro istant and looks great, but costs more, H4 treated nine



popular because it's economical and you can buy it anywhere and because it's treated, it won't rot either. The debate is and because it's treated, it won't role either. In the debate is a around whether the timber treatment chemicals will leach into the soil you're growing your veges in. If you're not comfortable with treated timber you can staple polythem sheet around the inside of the planks as a barrier between the timber and soil. Just remember that good drainage is important for a raised garden so don't run the polythene sheet over the bottom of

the garden.

They can be the simple 6 x 2 nailed or screwe together or something a bit or a lot fancier. Ther are plenty of plans on the web if you need ther (most are downloadable for free). You probably hav Il the tools you need in your own shed

The best part about a raised garden is that you can fi it with the very best soil, which can be your ow it with the very best soil, which can be your own compost or bags from the local DYI store. Once you got it built it's time for the garden. Spread about six layers of old newspaper over the ground to help prevent weed growth, then wet down with a little water to hold the paper in place while you add

soil. You can then just put in your layer of compo or bagged mix from the shop, or make it even eaby simply using vege mix (a garden mix and pottin mix combo). You don't have to fill it right to the to

and you are ready to go.

You will be absolutely amazed at the speed and health of you vegetables and its as easy as. Have a go!!
