Box Fit at Next Level Fitness (Dane Ludbrook)

The popular Box Fit craze is continuing to sweep through New Zealand using non-body contact boxing moves to help shed those stubborn kilo's and develop core strength and coordination. Box Fit is a cardiovascular workout increasing stamina in the heart and lungs. The sessions at Next Level Fitness will last about 45 mins and are for all levels of fitness. It is based on the training used by the police and military, including footwork and abdominal, focusing on fitness and toning.

Inglewood Heritage Centre News (Gay Laurence)

The history of Inglewood's Post Office and Telephone Exchange. A display is now open which depicts the history of 1875 - 2019. A fantastic exhibition showing Inglewood and its historical heart. Check out the then and now, find the locals that worked there, you may know many of them.

In 1867 the Inglewood community signed a petition asking that a separate post and telegraph building be erected on the section originally set apart for the purpose. It was on the corner of Junction and Mountain roads. (Rata and Hea Streets now). Mail at that time was often addressed to "Mounton".

1875: The first official Post Office was opened in the "Government Store" close to the Kurapepe stream, the second in Franklyn's Store, (Martins Fashions site), the third in the Railway Station.

1900: Population of Inglewood is now 715. The first Inglewood Telephone Exchange has opened (six subscribers)

1902: Finally the new dedicated Post Office is completed (the fourth). It is a fine, substantial, high quality, brick two storied building at the corner of Rata Street and Mountain Road (Hea Street), containing a public office, mail room, postmaster's room, private box lobby with forty-two boxes, telegraph lobby and a residence for the Postmaster.

1986: This historic landmark disappears. What was once a proud building that had stood the test of time is demolished, consigned to history, photos and memories.

The new purpose built Post Office at 25 Rata Street is opened, ten years later it is closed.

1998: The new 'building' is sold and becomes the Fun! Ho! Toy Museum which includes the Inglewood Heritage Centre.

Her daughter Courtney was able to delay her bedtime by accompanying Mum to our meeting and we could see that she has inherited artistic flair too.

After one or two simple pointers and a quick demonstration it was our turn to create. I think everyone was delighted with their results. Durham WI have a lovely collection of gifts to distribute to some extra special Mothers. Woolen jugs were donated to several organisations including Maristino. Neo-Natal also received crocheted crochets and Pregnancy Help were the recipients of booties, hats and jackets too. There was some discussion about sourcing more wool for our prolific knitters. We are still collecting used stamps, plastic bread tags and aluminium can also. Elaine Jones read the recent letter she had received from our Horden WI Link in England. This is their Centennial year so there are many interesting activities taking place.

Garden Clues with Sue (Sue Marsh)

The warm mild weather has continued, but guess the weather will be changing quite quickly, but enjoy the late autumn while we can get it. As you have harvested your late summer, autumn crops, make sure you refill the beds with compost or vegetable mix, and you can plant broccoli, cauliflower or cabbage for late spring harvest. Plant bok choy or kale for late winter harvest, and directly sow in trays or pots, rocket, mesclun, lettuce, spinach, radish, snow-peas, peas and broadbeans for spring/summer harvest. Direct sow parsnip, radish, kohlrabi, swede or turnips. Just remember, good things take time, so it's important you understand the truth of how long from seedling to harvest. For example, broccoli will take 3 months, a lettuce 6 weeks, and grills 6 months. Add some frosty cold weather and everything slows, almost grinding to a halt. So when we say planting the winter garden - it's just that - planting. The food you're harvesting now was hopefully planted in late summer, or early autumn. Feijoa are in abundance now, but think about pruning right after harvest. Remove dead, damaged, crossing and vertical wood. Remove all the low wood to give your feijoa a clear trunk, for healthy airflow and easy access to the fallen fruits which are so much better than the picked ones. Use mostly thinning cuts to produce an open canopy for good light penetration and access for bird and bee pollinators. Thinning cuts stimulate a heap of replacement wood - important because feijoa fruit on the base of the new wood. A cycle of fresh wood coming on each season means you can keep your tree compact yet productive. Leave plenty of young new shoots for next year's trees, then finish off with a few heading cuts for height and wood management. Don't forget to pop in some pansies, polyanthus or primulas for your winter flower garden, plenty to choose from. Happy gardening!

Free Road Code Course at Inglewood High (Courtney Milleden)

This term Inglewood High will host Road Code Theory, a free course designed to teach students how to pass their written driver's licence tests, on Tuesdays from 3.30pm to 6.00pm. Road Code Theory teaches students how to study the road code. It uses interactive classroom exercises, computer activities, practice tests, instructional videos, and class discussions to learn the rules of the road. Students are allowed to enrol in the course as many times as necessary before they are ready to pass their driver's licence. Students can be working toward their learners, restricted, or HT licence. (The HT licence is for those learning to drive vehicles that weigh more than 6,000 kg, like trucks, trailers, forklifts, and buses.)

The course is designed for those with literacy issues, including dyslexia. Generally, these students need or needed assistance in school. These students struggle with reading, writing, and handling numbers. This course is geared towards students who would struggle to learn if they sat at home reading a book on the road code. The course is offered through Taranaki Adult Literacy Services, a not-for-profit charity which provides free and subsidized community education courses. This course is also offered in Waitara and New Plymouth. Students do not need to be enrolled at Inglewood High to take the course. Students must be at least 16.
